

Mystee Opai joined Northpower in 2020 through a cadetship programme with People Potential. Part of the programme was to give young people from the community exposure to different parts of the Northpower business and experience different roles across the industry.

Mystee worked across various parts of the Northpower Contracting business as part of her cadetship, including in the faults dispatch team, fault's crews, vegetation crews and the stores department.

At the end of the cadet programme, Northland Contracting offered Mystee a position as a Trainee Cable Jointer, where she was placed into an underground crew under the direct supervision of a foreperson to begin her trade training.

Later that year he unfortunately he passed away, so I decided to take that level of knowledge and experience to Auckland. After 2 years in the industry covid-19 hit the country causing the business to drop. I then moved back to Kaitaia in hopes to get back on my feet.

With the encouragement of my father Rolly Noble who has been an employee with Fulton Hogan for over 25 years, I then applied at FH Kaitaia. I started my journey on a stop /go paddle for my first year but my interest in the job grew and I was eager to learn more and get involved to which I achieved in getting my class two RTW license the following year with the help of Fulton Hogan.
